# The Reason for the Season





IT WAS BAD ENOUGH WHEN THOMAS NAST CARICATURED THE IRISH, WE SHOULD NOT DO IT TO OURSELVES. DON'T BE THIS GUY, BE A **HIBERNIAN.** 

We once again look forward to another March, and the celebration of our Irish Heritage centered around the feast of St. Patrick. There is indeed much to celebrate. At the same time, to steal a phrase from another holiday, we should never forget "The Reason for the Season."

While the first St. Patrick's Day parade in New York City is recorded as a church parade by Irish soldiers in the British Army stationed in colonial New York, it soon evolved to have another significance with the influx of Irish Catholic immigrants in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century. These immigrants were greeted by open hostility and prejudice, and the St. Patrick's Day parade was a time to show the falsehoods of their propaganda. They claimed that Irish Catholics could not be loyal Americans; well, look at the battalions of veterans marching in the parade. They claimed that the Irish were incorrigible criminals; well, look at the ranks of Irish American police officers. They claimed that the Irish were perpetual paupers, look at how many state and national leaders are marching, not to mention teachers, nurses, firefighters, and people contributing to every aspect of American society.

Very sadly, as a society, we have, in many cases, lost the true meaning of St. Patrick's day, and we should be concerned. We see it trivialized as "St. Patty's Day" [sic] and as Mardi Gras II. We hear that "Everyone is Irish for the Day," but too often that is used as an excuse for drunken revelry, as one T-shirt currently for sale states, "Let's Get Drunk and Blame it on the Irish."

As Irish Americans, we need to return to the roots of our holiday and, on a broader level, embrace and promote Irish American Heritage Month, established yearly by Presidential proclamation. Sadly, our own children in school are learning about every other heritage but our own; in a cruel irony, Irish Americans (and, to be fair Italian Americans, Jewish Americans, and others) are now lumped in with the very people who displayed bigotry against them. To cite one example, it is incredibly sad that Kathleen McNulty, born in Donegal and one of the first programmers of the first electronic computer, and

Sister Mary Kenneth Keller, Ph.D., a daughter of Irish immigrants and the first woman and only the second person to earn a Ph.D. in Computer Science, continue to remain "Hidden Figures." "The Woke" are strangely asleep regarding the anti-Irish bigotry of Thomas Nast, Louise May Alcott, Samuel Morse, and others. We should not be calling for the removal of statues, but we certainly shouldn't accept it being hand-waved away because the targets of their bigotry were Irish.

Heritage is not a gift you receive; it is a gift you give to the next generation. Are ancestors passed our Irish pride and heritage onto us, often at considerable risk and sacrifice; how sad if we do not do the same. -Edmund Burke noted, "People will not look forward to posterity who never look backward to their ancestors." We have seen that proved in our own lifetime as other ethnic groups, which once had big parades, celebrations, and organizations, have faded away and disappeared; we need to learn from their example. Show your pride in marching in this year's parade, and more importantly, take some time to tell the stories of your parents and grandparents to your children and grandchildren. Remember, if you don't, their story and the story of the Irish in America do not go on.
